They are in addition to and in compliance with guidelines issued by the government of the District of Columbia (DC), the Grand Lodge of DC, and the management of the TMC. These guidelines are meant to be fluid and could change as conditions change.

- While we will not require proof, all attendees must be fully vaccinated.
- All attendees should wear masks at all times.
- No food or drink will be served. Only water bottles will be allowed. We will have markers to label water bottles.
- Temperature checks will be conducted upon entry.

Did You Know... That Francis Scott Key was a fellow Brother Master Mason?

As many of the Brethren are aware, September 14 marks the anniversary of the writing of The Star-Spangled Banner, our National Anthem. It was the events of the previous night, where Fort McHenry in Baltimore was being bombarded by the British Navy in the War of 1812, that Bro. Francis Scott Key laid witness to the events aboard a ship delayed in the harbor. He was so inspired by both the events of the battle, and that the U.S. flag was flying triumphantly above the fort the following morning, that he penned the verses that would later be paired with the popular British drinking song To Anacreon in Heaven.

It wasn't until 1889 that the United States Navy recognized The Star-Spangled Banner for official use, and, even further, 1931 was the year that congressional resolution made the song our national anthem.

I know that I'll personally have just that little bit of extra pride knowing that our National Anthem was written by a fellow Mason.


